A note on Roman names: we have listed Romans of the Republican and early imperial periods by their common anglicized name instead of by *nomen*, e.g. “Cicero (M. Tullius Cicero),” “Pliny the Younger (G. Plinius Caecilius Secundus).” Romans for whom there is no such common name are listed by the name most commonly found in the text, e.g. “Crispinus (Vettius Crispinus, son of M. Vettius Bolanus).” While such a system inevitably does some violence to Roman naming conventions and is not strictly consistent, it does follow the usage by the various authors of this book and should thus make the index easier to use for most readers.
