The Way We Were

This month we take a snapshot of life 50 years ago, and compare it with life today. Information for this article was collected from the State Commerce and Statistics Department.

Family Life	Families used to be bigger, with an average of 3.6 children. Nowadays the average family has 2.1 children. Many households didn't have a television, compared to over two sets per household now. Families played board games as there were no computer or television games.
Salaries	The average income for a family was \$5,000. The average family income now is \$48,000, almost 10 times more. However, the cost of many things today is at least 15 times more!
Work	The father was usually the only parent working outside the house. Mothers didn't usually use to have paid jobs, even part-time jobs. Most were homemakers. Many teenagers had part-time jobs delivering newspapers or cleaning up the garden.
Housing	Houses used to be half the size, and most had only one bathroom. Very few families lived in apartments—over 80% of the population lived in houses. The average cost of a house used to be twice the average yearly family income. Now it is more than five times the average yearly family income.
Education	Less than 10% of the population used to go to university. In fact there were fewer than 4,000 universities in the country, whereas today there are 16,000. Nowadays, more than 40% of people finish their education with a college degree.

Toronto has one of the best public transportation systems in North America. It is also the third busiest after New York City and Mexico City. We have the largest passenger train and subway system in Canada and a fantastic bus system. In addition, unlike many North American cities, which lost their streetcars in the middle of the twentieth century, we kept ours.
