Ahmad Qābel and Contemporary Islamic Thought

Ahmad Qābel (1954-2012) was one of the key figures in the "New Religious Thinking" trend of reformist thought, whose radical views were some of the most daring of his generation, seeking to rationalize and modernize understandings of the shariah. In this comprehensively researched and accessibly written book, Lloyd Ridgeon offers an original examination of Qābel's writings, including the articles that comprise his seminal work Shari'at-e 'aqlani (Rational Shariah). Throughout his career, Qābel crossed many political and religious redlines set by the Principlist authorities of the Islamic Republic of Iran, resulting in several prison terms and hastening his premature death while under hospital arrest. Chapters covering jurisprudence, religious history, politics, gender relations, apostasy, society and superstition unravel Qābel's worldview, introducing and illuminating his work for all readers. With extended translations from Qābel's compositions, including two articles from Shari'at-e 'aqlani, Ridgeon offers the necessary context to understand the resounding significance of Qābel's ideas and arguments.

Lloyd Ridgeon is Reader in Islamic Studies at the University of Glasgow. He has published much on medieval Persian Sufism, including Awhad al-Dīn Kirmānī and the Controversy of the Sufi Gaze (2018). He also has a keen interest in modern Iran, as reflected in his publication Hijab (2021). He is also the chief editor of the British Journal of Middle Eastern Studies.
