Equality and Discrimination Law in Australia: An Introduction explores four decades of anti-discrimination laws in Australia. Beth Gaze and Belinda Smith argue that effective laws protecting against and deterring discrimination are vital for a fair future, and emphasise the theoretical and social contexts that underpin this area of the law.

Their ground-breaking approach begins by analysing equality as a goal of the law, and acknowledges that to prevent discrimination, modern laws must challenge the beliefs, practices, systems and structures that enable it. The text is divided into three sections: the first addresses the social and conceptual context, history and framework of anti-discrimination laws; the second analyses the main elements of the law and the processes of enforcement; and the third explores broader avenues for pursuing equality beyond simply prohibiting discrimination. This book provides readers with a clear understanding of the development of Australia's anti-discrimination laws, and builds a foundation for critical assessment of their strengths and limitations in addressing discrimination and promoting equality.

Written in a clear and concise style, *Equality and Discrimination Law in Australia: An Introduction* is a vital resource for students, practitioners, and anyone who wants to understand this important field of law.
