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Contributions are very welcome. They should be sent to the Editor, Jon Agar, Department of Science and Technology Studies, University College London, Gower Street, London, WC1E 6BT, email uchrjea@ucl.ac.uk. They are considered on the understanding that they are unpublished and are not on offer to another journal. Contributions should be submitted in electronic form as an email attachment, preferably in MS Word format. Hard copies on A4 or American quarto paper are, however, acceptable, by arrangement with the editor.

Texts should be double spaced with a margin. Always include an abstract of 150–200 words. Long quotations should be inset. Short quotations should be given single quotation marks. Spelling should follow the *Oxford English Dictionary*. All papers should be rigorously documented. References to primary and secondary sources must be set as endnotes, not as footnotes, and typed in double spacing and numbered consecutively. Cite as follows:

For manuscript sources please supply whatever information is necessary for the reference to be found. Subsequent references can be cited by name, date, abbreviated source, box, page or folio number.
