# **European Political Science Review**

#### *Instructions to Contributors*

The European Political Science Review (*EPSR*) publishes high quality scholarly research in political science, focusing on the most important debates in the discipline and demonstrating the highest possible standards in conceptualisation, theorisation and methodology. Submissions should emphasise why they are of interest to a broad readership across sub-disciplines and should engage with central theoretical debates in political science. *EPSR* welcomes empirical papers based on either qualitative or quantitative methodologies. These papers should be placed in the context of larger (theoretical) debates in the discipline. *EPSR* also welcomes conceptual and theoretical papers as well as contributions from the field of normative political theory.

**EPSR** is not concerned solely with European political issues nor is it conceived as exclusively for European scholars. Submissions dealing with global issues and non-European topics are very much welcome.

We wish the journal's readership to be as wide and diverse as possible, including both scholars and practitioners. Therefore articles should be written in an accessible manner with a minimum of jargon and insider language.

In addition to our primary concern with the quality of the articles to be published in **EPSR**, there are several additional considerations for prospective authors:

- 1) We will consider only original work for publication in the Journal. Any manuscript that contains extensive material –text, tables, figures– that has been published elsewhere is not suitable for *EPSR*. One possible exception to this rule would be for articles that will appear in edited books, whether in whole or in part, at least six months after the appearance of the issue of the Journal.
- 2) **EPSR** does not consider manuscripts that are under consideration for other journals, or articles that are derived directly from books under consideration elsewhere. We will ask any authors to confirm that the manuscript is not being submitted elsewhere. If you have questions about this policy in respect to individual manuscripts please contact the editors.
- In so far as possible, the research methods and evidence used in manuscripts should be discussed in sufficient detail to allow other scholars to understand and replicate any findings. This requirement is more easily understood in reference to quantitative research, whether with aggregate data, survey data or experiments, but should also be followed with respect to qualitative analysis. We welcome authors to make their

data sets available in the Cambridge University Press website for purposes of replication.

- 4) **EPSR** uses the conventional double-blind process of peer review. Therefore, we request that you remove all references and citations that would identify the authors. If this is not done adequately we will return the manuscript to you for amendments. In addition to obvious mentions of previous publications by the authors, anonymity should be ensured by removing thanks to colleagues, references to own websites, etc.
- 5) **EPSR** only accepts manuscripts that have been submitted online through Manuscript Central (MC) via the following link:

When a manuscript is submitted it should be done in two parts. One will consist of the manuscript made anonymous as in (4) above. This submission should also include an abstract (maximum of 150 words) and up to five key words. The second will be a title page with all authors and acknowledgments. All material should be sent as individual, editable files (e.g., .doc, .jpg), and NOT as a PDF document. In the case of multiple authors, the authors should also identify the contact author for the Editors and channel all communications through that individual.

- Referencing should be in accordance with the Harvard Chicago system (see <a href="http://www.libweb.anglia.ac.uk/referencing/harvard.htm">http://www.libweb.anglia.ac.uk/referencing/harvard.htm</a>). References to works in the text should be in the form of (name, year). The reference list should be presented alphabetically (using initials instead of full names) and chronologically by author at the end of the text. Substantive footnotes are allowed but should be kept to a minimum.
- Manuscripts should not exceed 10,000 words. Figures and Tables should be submitted on separate pages, with the suggested location of the tabular material indicated in the text. If you request colour figures in the printed version, you will be contacted by CCC-Rightslink who are acting on our behalf to collect Author Charges. Please follow their instructions in order to avoid any delay in the publication of your article. Figures and tables that are not crucial to the argument can be put on the website of the Journal as an appendix. Data tables that are likely to take up more than a single printed page should be submitted separately as supplementary material and referred to in the text of the article. The manuscript should be double-spaced throughout, including references, and be no smaller than 12pt type. Once accepted, manuscripts will be available online.
- 8) For authors whose first language is not English the primary responsibility for having the manuscript in proper English will reside with the author. Review and/or publication may be delayed if there are problems with language. Either British or American spellings are acceptable so long either the one or the other is employed

consistently within the article. Please consult *Chicago Manual of Style* (http://chicagomanualof style/home.html) on English usage. Authors, particularly those whose first language is not English, may wish to have their English-language manuscripts checked by a native speaker before submission. This is optional, but may help to ensure that the academic content of the paper is fully understood by the editor and any reviewers. We list a number of third-party services specialising in language editing and / or translation, and suggest that authors contact as appropriate. Please note that the use of any of these services is voluntary, and at the author's own expense. Use of these services does not guarantee that the manuscript will be accepted for publication, nor does it restrict the author to submitting to a Cambridge published journal.
