

Japanese Journal of Political Science

Manuscripts

The Editor welcomes the submission of materials for consideration as a main article of the Journal. The approximate length required for main articles is 7,000 to 10,000 words, including tables, figures, reference, appendices, and endnotes.

The Japanese journal of Political Science is a refereed journal which adopts double-blind reviewing system, and contributors should allow time for the process of refereeing to take place.

An abstract (no more than 250 words) together with a brief author profile (150 words or less) should accompany the submission. The author's name and affiliation must not appear on the main body of your manuscript, but only on a separate cover sheet.

The desired location of tables and figures is to be indicated in the text, but all tables and figures are to be placed on separate sheets at the end of the article, following the notes and references. Tables and figures can be submitted in a separate file.

When an article has been accepted for publication after the process of review and revise, the author should submit a final version of the article in a Word file (MS-Word 2003 or later) to the editorial office of the Japanese Journal of Political Science as an e-mail attachment.

Referencing : Harvard (author-year) system

Whenever you are quoting the exact words of another writer; closely summarising a passage from another writer; or using an idea or material which is directly based on the

work of another writer, you must identify and acknowledge your source in a systematic style of referencing. We basically recommend the Harvard system of referencing.

There are two parts to the author-year system of referencing.

References (author and year of publication) are briefly cited within the text (called *embedded* or *in-text* referencing), and then all of the resources referred to in the body of the writing are given at the end of the manuscript in the *reference list*. References should give full bibliographical details in the alphabetical order. Each item should include: full name (surname and first name) of the author, date of publication in parenthesis, title of the source e.g. such as book and article in *italics*, place of publication and the publisher, and pages numbers if necessary.

Example of Citation

For citation, use the surname of the author and the year of publication, basically.

If there are two authors, cite both. If there are more than two authors, cite only the first followed by 'et al.', which means 'and others'.

If an author has published more documents in the same year, distinguish between them by adding lower-case letters.

Example 1

Benedict Anderson, a political scientist at Cornell University, has gone so far as to say that the American academic writing is targeted at narrowly defined professional audience and its style is "boring" to other potential readers (Anderson, 2009a, 2009b).

Example 2

Just as Midland, Texas has brought up George W. Bush and Tommy Franks and thus shaped United States war policy in Iraq, Ann Arbor, Michigan has exemplified and thus arguably shaped quintessentially American political science. It is the trinity of robust academic professionalism, solid positivism and heavy methodological armory has been a trademark of American political science (Gunnell, 2004; Easton et al, 1995, Oren, 2003).

Endnotes

Endnotes and Appendix can be used as sparingly as possible where needed to expand or enforce your article. In this case, endnotes need to be given consecutive numbers through the whole manuscript.

Copyedit and Proof-check

After your manuscript is accepted, it will be copyedited and the first proof data (PDF) should be sent to the contributors. They are to be read and corrected by contributors. The contributors return the checked and corrected proofs, by airmail or e-mail where appropriate, within seven days of receiving them. Authors will receive a PDF offprint of their article. Printed article may be purchased from the publisher if ordered at first proof stage.
