

> This is the first volume to appear in the Cambridge edition of the works of John Webster, beginning with The White Devil and The Duchess of Malfi. The following volume will include the other plays as well as the poems and prose (with the exception of those collaborative plays already published in the Cambridge editions of Dekker, and Beaumont and Fletcher under the editorship of Fredson Bowers). While both The White Devil and The Duchess of Malfi are available in modernized versions, this Cambridge critical edition preserves the original spelling, and incorporates the most recent editorial scholarship, including valuable information on Webster's life, new critical methods, and textual theory. In particular, the edition integrates theatrical aspects of the plays with their bibliographical and literary features in a way not previously attempted in a scholarly edition of a Jacobean dramatist. The edition also presents previously unpublished material, including a fragment of an otherwise lost play and a hitherto unknown poem, and provides a brief biography, an account of the Webster canon, illustrations, and critical and theatrical history of each play. The edition will be of interest to scholars and students of drama and English literature, and to theatre practitioners and historians.

General preface

David Gunby, after preliminary discussions with D. F. McKenzie, approached David Carnegie with a view to collaboration on a new edition of the Works of John Webster. The outcome was an initial proposal, to the then Publisher of the Cambridge University Press, Michael Black, in which David Gunby and David Carnegie argued not only that the standard edition of the Works by F. L. Lucas, admirable though it was for its time, was out of date, but also that any new critical, old-spelling edition should break new ground by seeking consciously to combine literary and theatrical concerns with those strictly bibliographical. This letter met with a favourable response, and the two were asked to prepare a detailed proposal, together with a scene-length specimen of text and commentary.

The specimen scene, The arraignment of Vittoria from The White Devil (III.ii), was completed and submitted with a detailed proposal while the two editors were on leave in Britain in 1975, and accepted by the Syndics of the Cambridge University Press. Work then began on the first volume (containing The White Devil and The Duchess of Malfi). Several years' work (some of it spent, on David Gunby's part, preparing machine-readable texts of the entire corpus of Webster's works, together with a wide range of control texts by Webster's contemporaries, for computer authorship analysis by experts who promised much but delivered nothing) convinced the two editors that if the edition were to appear this century, a third editor was needed. In 1979, therefore, Antony Hammond was approached, and he responded enthusiastically to the suggestion that he take over responsibility for the Webster texts, leaving David Carnegie to concentrate solely on theatre responsibilities, while David Gunby continued to be responsible for the literary aspects of the edition, including Webster's life and sources. In 1984 the project was further strengthened when Doreen DelVecchio joined Antony Hammond as Associate Textual Editor.

With the editorial team enlarged, and the burden of editing more equitably distributed, faster progress was made, and much heartened by a week in 1988, when they all conferred face to face for the first time in

Toronto, the three editors, meeting and working together again in Toronto in October 1992, finally brought Volume one to completion.

The lengthy genesis of Volume one has not been without benefit. In an edition where one of the key elements is the importance not only of bibliographical principles in establishing a text but also of dramatic and literary considerations, debate is essential, and it has been apparent repeatedly that lengthy consideration can bring about new understandings of textual cruces, staging problems, or passages resistant to critical elucidation. The edition is much the better for this discussion, and for the considerable new scholarship during this period.

In suggesting a new edition, David Gunby and David Carnegie argued that major advances had been made, since the appearance of the Lucas edition, in bibliography and theatre history, and that they could take full advantage of this new knowledge, as well as of developments in critical understanding. Here again, the number of professional productions of *The White Devil* and *The Duchess of Malfi* in the last decade has been considerable, and the insights gained from a study of them extremely valuable.

Attractive in theory though the notion might be of including in this edition all works of which scholarly opinion finds Webster to be partly or wholly the author, in practice there seems no justification in duplicating the work done by the editors of recent old-spelling editions. Hence the three works written in collaboration with Thomas Dekker and included in the Bowers edition of The Dramatic Works of Thomas Dekker—Sir Thomas Wyatt, Northward Ho, and Westward Ho—are omitted from this edition, together with The Fair Maid of the Inn (believed to be a completion by Webster, Ford, and Massinger of a play begun by Fletcher) which is to be included in the Cambridge edition of The Dramatic Works in the Beaumont and Fletcher Canon.

The decision to include the additions to John Marston's *The Malcontent*, as well as the Induction, was made on the grounds that scholarly investigation has established that there is a significant likelihood that the additions were by Webster. The reasons for the inclusion of 'Qualis Vita' and the Melbourne manuscript are set out in articles by Gunby (1992) and Hammond and DelVecchio (1988).

The editing of the two Webster plays contained in this volume has proceeded along the lines envisaged throughout, with each editor taking primary responsibility for one aspect of the editing process, but all three jointly as well as severally responsible for the outcomes. (As Associate Textual Editor, Doreen DelVecchio has shared responsibility for the

Textual introductions; her assistance with other aspects of the edition has been extensive, but she bears no responsibility for decisions made by the editors. The Note on the music in *The Duchess of Malfi* is by Peter Walls, whose specialist contribution is greatly appreciated.) The only parts of the volume for which editors take individual responsibility are those credited to them: the Critical, Theatrical, and Textual introductions. Yet here too there has been considerable consultation, with editors reading and commenting on each others' introductions.

The aim of the editors has been to work by consensus, and in general we have had little difficulty. No attempt has been made, however, to disguise those rare instances where we have been unable to reach agreement, and this is acknowledged, usually with cross reference to the views of the other editor(s). One area where consensus did not prove possible (the editors adopting three different positions on the matter) was that of whether old spelling should be carried through into the introductions and Commentary (as in the Original-Spelling Edition of the Oxford Shakespeare). The decision was therefore taken to follow the usual Cambridge practice, in which old spelling is restricted to the text, collation, and, as appropriate, to the Textual introductions.

As is appropriate in an edition whose rationale includes the joint consideration of literary, theatrical, and bibliographical concerns, there is no separation of textual from theatrical and literary notes, though the collation is, of course, given separately.

One of the difficulties associated with the production, seriatim, of an edition in more than one volume, is that of reference to works not contained in Volume one. The expedient adopted here, faute de mieux, is to use the lineation of the Lucas edition, indicated thus: DLC (Lucas) I.i.150–1. To save space, abbreviation is widely employed, not only for all works by Webster, but also for other works if referred to more than twice. A List of abbreviations is found on pp. xvi–xxxi. Where, in the Commentary, reference is made to another editor (e.g., Lucas or Brown) or to Dent without further detail, such reference is to the appropriate passage in their volumes.
