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PREFACE

The origin of this work was a footnote in an article by Professor A. H. M. Jones on the Roman Civil Service. Since 1955 the footnote has grown into a book and beyond, largely because neither he, as I suspect, nor I certainly, envisaged that the evidence would present itself in quite such formidable quantities or pose such challenging problems of interpretation and presentation. These factors also made necessary a long series of preliminary studies, which in turn have contributed to the long delay in putting this book into definitive form. The nature of the material and of the writing is intractable, and it has become increasingly clear to me that time and effort will not bring much improvement. Hence I have thought it better to present the subject all together as it appears to me now rather than to pursue an unattainable perfection at the cost of an indefinite delay.

This is also an appropriate moment for stocktaking. Until quite recently the *Familia Caesaris* was an almost totally neglected field, despite its obvious importance for early Imperial social and administrative history, as well as for onomastics. But in the last few years two major studies in particular have appeared by G. Boulvert and H. Chantraine. I have taken this opportunity to point out the areas where progress and agreement can be recorded and where the main problems still lie.

I have deferred to advice consistently offered by those best qualified to judge and have given the concordances to *CIL* with Dessau's *ILS* and the other main epigraphical collections. In many instances, however, the current epigraphical conventions produce unnecessary complications, e.g. III 431 = 7116 = 13674 = D 1449 or vi 8655 a = XIV 4120.3 = XV 7142 = D 1702 or even x 6638 = 1² pp. 247 f. No. xvii = *I. It.* XIII 1, pp. 320 f. No. 31; not to mention the Greek inscriptions from the eastern provinces. I remain to be fully convinced that this practice is justified in terms of practical value when measured against the potential source of error it introduces, the increased costs of publication and the considerable expenditure of time and mental energy that it entails in a work of this sort. A standard, readily accessible, complete set of epigraphical concordances to which reference could easily be made, e.g. for *ILS*, by a simple symbol added to the basic *CIL* reference, would seem to be a modest desideratum.

My grateful acknowledgements are due to King's College, Cambridge, for the award of the Augustus Austen Leigh Studentship which enabled me to begin, and for much subsequent hospitality; to the University of Western Australia for an extended period of leave in 1962–4 which enabled me to continue; to the Australian Research Grants Committee and to the University of Tasmania for generous research grants and a period of study-leave in 1970 which enabled me at last to finish. To the Council of the Society for the Promotion of Roman Studies and to the editors of *Classical Quarterly*, *Historia*, and *Proceedings of the Cambridge Philological Society* I am indebted for permission to incorporate in Parts I and III of this book revised versions of articles which originally appeared in their journals. My thanks are also due to many friends and colleagues, especially in the Universities of Cambridge, Western Australia and Tasmania, for much helpful discussion. In particular I should mention Dr A. H. McDonald and the late Sir Frank Adcock for help in the choice of a topic, Miss J. M. Reynolds and J. A. Crook for expert advice unfailingly given, and Professor Moses Finley, who took an unusually keen and stimulating interest in *Familia Caesaris* from the beginning, for making my several returns to Cambridge so pleasant and profitable. My greatest debt, however, is due to the late Professor A. H. M. Jones for his guidance, criticism, deep scholarship and warm friendship. His sudden death has meant the loss of one of the greatest of ancient historians. It is as a personal token of piety and appreciation that I dedicate this volume to his memory.
