Finally, I must acknowledge the support of my husband Tom whose constant enthusiasm and encouragement kept me working on frequently frustrating tasks.

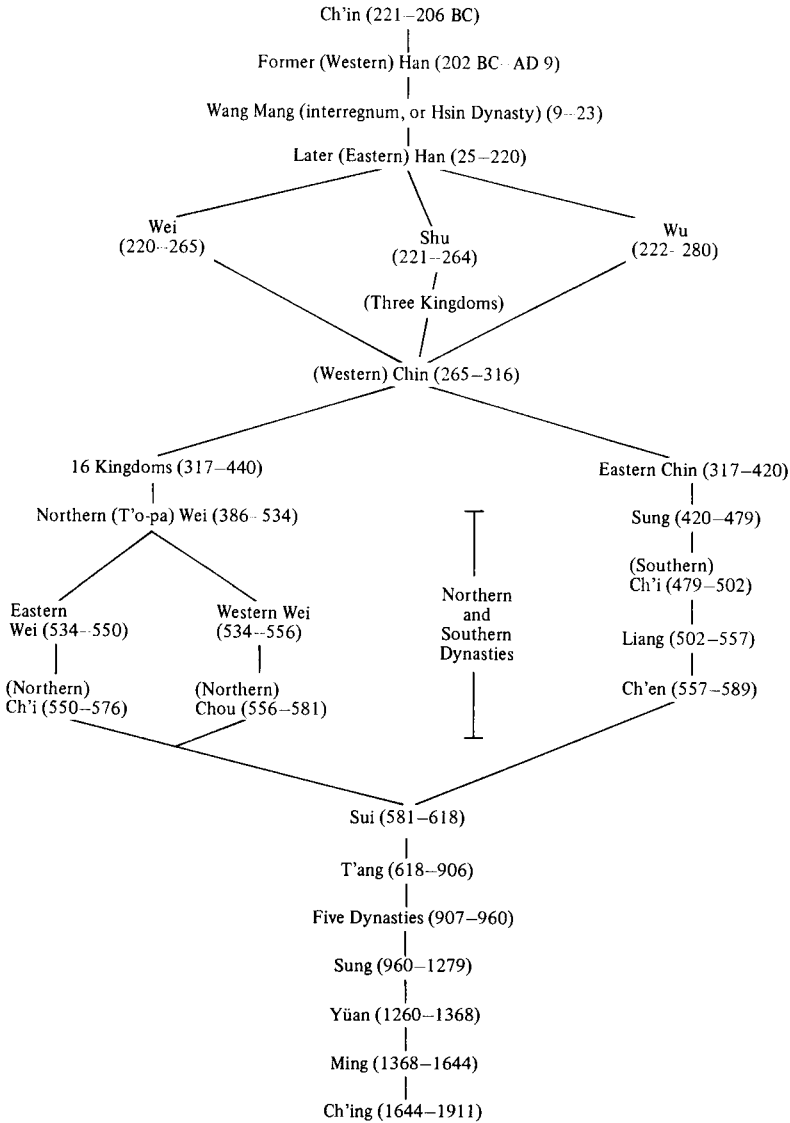
