FOREWORD

I count it a great privilege to be asked to write a Foreword to this volume of essays in honour of Professor David Winton Thomas.

My own life has been greatly enriched by his friendship over the years. His was a name to conjure with in the Hebrew Room at Merchant Taylors' School—it was a source of encouragement to know that the man who had covered himself with glory at Cambridge had sat where I sat and grappled with Davidson and with Brown, Driver and Briggs. Then he succeeded two of my greatest teachers in the chair of the Regius Professorship of Hebrew at Cambridge, R. H. Kennett and S. A. Cook—a goodly succession, indeed.

Recently, as President of the Society for Old Testament Study in its Jubilee Year, I have been in touch with him again and have been enabled to see how much that learned Society owes to his leadership and inspiration. Archaeology and Old Testament Study, which he edited, alone will serve as a reminder of that fact.

My closest association with him was over a period of four years when together we worked on *The Revised Psalter*. It was a small, happy and closely knit team that produced that book, including among its members T. S. Eliot and C. S. Lewis. The man to whom, above all others, we looked for guidance in the realm of Hebrew scholarship was David Winton Thomas. Nor were we ever disappointed. From his store of Semitic scholarship he would draw out things new and old and, weighing them up with a nicely balanced sense of judgement, would ensure a translation which did not do despite to the meaning of the original.

The translation of the Bible into the multitudinous languages of the world is a task which calls for great and varied skills. Translators all over the globe have to rely on experts in the sphere of Semitics to guide them in their work. In the very front

rank of experts in *Understanding the Old Testament* (to quote the title of his Ethel M. Wood Lecture, 1967), David Winton Thomas has stood for many years and will stand, we hope, for many more.

We salute him-with gratitude and affection.
