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PREFACE

IT has been suggested that a reprint of the chapters on Greek art in the Cambridge Ancient History might be found useful by students.

Our thanks are due to the editors of the Cambridge Ancient History for permission to reprint them.

The first chapters were written in 1924, the last in 1928. No substantial alterations have been possible, but the text has been revised, a number of new pictures—including a plate of gems and two plates of coins—added, and the bibliography remodelled. Sections I–XIII are the work of Mr Beazley, sections XIV–XIX of Mr Ashmole.

Where an object is not illustrated, a reference to the handiest picture elsewhere is given, usually to Winter's *Kunstgeschichte in Bildern* (cited as *KB.*). But it is hoped that the reader will not be content with pictures. Study of the objects themselves, whether on the sites or in museums, is essential. In England the British Museum, the Ashmolean Museum at Oxford, and the Fitzwilliam Museum at Cambridge, contain a wealth of original material, and there are also collections of casts of sculpture in Cambridge, Oxford and London.
