

PREFACE

This volume has its origins in a conference sponsored jointly by the Contemporary China Institute (School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London) and the Joint Committee on Contemporary China of the Social Science Research Council (USA) and the American Council of Learned Societies. The conference was held at Cumberland Lodge, in Windsor Park, England, from 30 June to 4 July 1980. The essays which follow, save one, were first presented at this gathering. (Professor Schram was unable to attend as he was engaged in research in China at the time.) The papers have been revised and updated in the light of conference discussions and political developments in China.

In addition to those listed in the contributors section, a number of other people participated in the conference: William S.
