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An exhaustive thematic or conceptual index was obviously impossible, but it is hoped that the compromise adopted here will prove helpful to readers.

The problems of indexing a bilingual text have been approached on a practical basis. Where the French term is identical with or very similar to its English equivalent, it has been suppressed. Where it is alphabetically remote from its English equivalent, it is cross-indexed and repeated after the equivalent word. French words covering a wide semantic area have been entered separately, but have usually been analysed under their English equivalents. Expressions used by Rousseau, some other French expressions difficult to translate precisely or concisely, and the titles of French works, have been left in the original language. In order to avoid confusion, French words have been italicised throughout.

Many inter-related themes have been grouped. Some trivial mention of proper names (mostly geographical) is omitted, as are the names of translators, except where a particular point is being made. The names of members of the Colloquium are not indexed except as authors of works published elsewhere.

It was not thought helpful to list under a single rubric *Rousseau* all allusion to and discussion of his ideas, personality and techniques. Reference to his works will be found under their respective French titles (which are also listed briefly under his name). Reference to his ideas and to special terms used by him will be found in the general alphabetical sequence. However, some references are given under his name, mainly to avoid ludicrous entries like ‘words, dying, Rousseau’s’.

Individual works of writers other than Rousseau are not separately indexed, but will be found under their author’s name. Mention in the Notes of individual works, whether by Rousseau or by other writers, is not indexed where it simply supplies volume and page references. In such cases, the index entry refers to the text itself, whether the work is actually named there or not.

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
