Robert Nozick's *Anarchy, State, and Utopia* (1974) is recognized as a classic of modern political philosophy. Along with John Rawls's *A Theory of Justice* (1971), it is widely credited with breathing new life into the discipline in the second half of the twentieth century. This *Companion* presents a balanced and comprehensive assessment of Nozick's contribution to political philosophy. In engaging and accessible chapters, the contributors analyze Nozick's ideas from a variety of perspectives and explore relatively neglected areas of the work such as his discussion of anarchism and his theory of utopia. Their detailed and illuminating picture of *Anarchy, State, and Utopia*, its impact and its enduring influence will be invaluable to students and scholars in both political philosophy and political theory.

GERALD GAUS is the James E. Rogers Professor of Philosophy at the University of Arizona. He is the author of *On Philosophy, Politics and Economics* (2008), *Contemporary Theories of Liberalism: Public Reason as a Post-Enlightenment Project* (2003), and *Justificatory Liberalism: an Essay on Epistemology and Political Theory* (1996), among other books. His book *The Order of Public Reason* has been published by Cambridge University Press. He is co-editor of *Politics, Philosophy, and Economics*.

CHANDRAN KUKATHAS is Chair in Political Theory in the Department of Government at the London School of Economics. Influential contributions include his books *The Liberal Archipelago: A Theory of Diversity and Freedom* (2003), *Rawls: A Theory of Justice and Its Critics* (with Philip Pettit, 1990) and *Hayek and Modern Liberalism* (1989) and his articles on the concepts of cultural rights, multiculturalism, and diversity.
