

M. Forster: Abinger Harvest', 'The literary life respectable, 1. Edwin Muir; 2. George Orwell', 'Academic case-history', 'Aldous Huxley: Eyeless in Gaza', "The case of Miss Dorothy Sayers', "Femina vie-heureuse" please note', 'Lady novelists and the lower orders' and 'The background of twentieth-century letters' all appeared in Scrutiny (vols. XIV, VII, XII, XI, VI, VII, IX, V, IX, XI, V, VI, VII, IV and vii respectively).

The remaining material – which it is not possible to date but which was mostly written in the last ten or so years of her life – including the texts of two public lectures ('The Anglo-Irish novel' given at Queen's University, Belfast in 1980 and '"That great controversy": the novel of religious controversy in the nineteenth century' given in the same year to the theology faculty of Bristol University) is published for the first time.
