This book brings together for the first time many of Professor Rosenberg's most important essays. The first two parts, which focus on ideas and institutions, are meant to underline interactions between these realms. The essays treat topics such as therapeutics and its relationship to social change in the nineteenth century; the practice of medicine in New York in the 1860s; and the rise and fall of the dispensary. The third part of the book focuses on the attempt to use history as a resource for discussion of a contemporary medical world that often seems out of control and in a semipermanent crisis – economic, organizational, and humane. The essays discuss themes that have become visible to the public: deinstitutionalization of the mentally ill and the status of psychiatry; the hospital as a social and economic problem; and the social negotiations surrounding AIDS.
