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This study makes extensive use of personal interviews and recently declassified U.S. government documents to cast fresh light on various aspects of American policy toward Nicaragua during the period from dictatorial to revolutionary rule. This is the first book to place U.S. policy during the Somoza crisis in a rigorous and compelling analytical framework.

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
