The employment of mythological language and imagery by an Epicurean poet – a professed adherent of a system which was not only materialist, but overtly hostile to myth and poetry – is highly paradoxical. This apparent contradiction has often been ascribed to a conflict in poet's personality, between reason and intellect, or to a desire to enliven his philosophical material with attractive mythological digressions. This book attempts to provide a more positive assessment of Lucretius' aims and methodology, by considering the poet's attitude to myth, and the rôle which it plays in the *De Rerum Natura*, against the background of earlier and contemporary views. Dr Gale suggests that Lucretius was not only aware of the tension between his two rôles as philosopher and poet, but attempted to resolve it by developing his own, Epicurean poetic, together with a bold and innovative theory of the origins and meaning of myth.

This book will be of interest to all classical scholars but especially to Latinists and those concerned with Lucretius and with ancient philosophy.

PREFACE

This book is a revised version of my Ph.D. thesis, ‘Myth in the *De Rerum Natura* of Lucretius’ (Cambridge 1991). With the intention of making it more accessible to the non-specialist reader, I have translated (or transliterated) all Greek words, phrases and quotations. For citations from the *De Rerum Natura*, I have used Bailey’s Oxford Classical Text (second edition, 1922) throughout.

I am indebted to a number of scholars and colleagues for their comments and advice. I would particularly like to thank my research supervisor, Michael Reeve, for many stimulating criticisms and suggestions; and my examiners, Don Fowler and John Henderson, for their invaluable comments, both verbal and written, which formed the basis for the revision of my thesis. I am also grateful to Myles Burnyeat, Philip Hardie, David Sedley and David West, who read drafts of my work at various stages of composition. I have benefited greatly by their scholarship and by improvements which they suggested. Finally, I would like to thank Steve Linley for help and support of many kinds: for advice on technical and editorial matters, for many hours spent proofreading the entire manuscript, for encouragement and moral support, and for bearing with me and Lucretius over the last six years.
