

This book offers a detailed and comprehensive guide to contemporary sources for research into the history of individual nineteenth-century U.S. communities, large and small. The book is arranged topically (covering demography, ethnicity and race, land use and settlement, religion, education, politics and local government, industry, trade and transportation, and poverty, health, and crime) and thus will be of great use, too, to those investigating particular historical themes at national, state, or regional level.

As well as treating a wide variety of the types of primary sources, published and unpublished, quantitative and qualitative, available for the study of many places, the book also provides information on certain specific sources and some individual collections, in particular those of the National Archives. Though not intended as a guide to individual archive depositories or libraries, nor as a detailed bibliography of the history of any particular place or region, the book provides references to guides, catalogs, and bibliographies of manuscript and printed sources, and to commentaries. Included, too, is discussion of significant subjects for research into the various topics and of appropriate methodological techniques and approaches.

This will prove a valuable work of reference to a wide range of university and college students and faculty, to libraries, archivists, family historians, and schoolteachers, and to many interested amateurs who wish to pursue seriously the study of their region or community, neighborhood or family, or some particular aspect of the American past.

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

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Author's preface

The need for a book of this kind was suggested to me in 1979 by my friend, Ben Bloxham, who originally hoped to collaborate with me in writing it. I wish particularly to thank Dean John M. Nagle of William and Mary for his considerable support.

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Without access to the holdings of the National Archives, Washington, DC, the Library of Congress, the Institute of Historical Research, the British Library, and the British Library of Political and Economic Science, my task would have been impossible. I wish, therefore, to thank the staffs of those institutions, and also those of the following depositories and libraries of which I made extensive use: Newberry Library, Chicago; Chicago Public Library; Chicago Historical Society; Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh; Virginia State Library; Family History Library, Salt Lake City; Bancroft Library, University of California, Berkeley, Hampton University, Virginia; and the libraries of the College of William and Mary, Chicago University, Northwestern University, Brigham Young University, University of Utah, University of Virginia, Virginia Commonwealth University, University of Pittsburgh, Carnegie-Mellon University, Pittsburgh, University of London, and University College London.
