They show how the social, political, and intellectual challenges cities posed were met by urban reformers; how cities enriched cultural life; and how European cities influenced and were influenced by colonial cities. No other book in English situates the story of cities within the overall framework of European and imperial history during the long nineteenth century. *Cities and the Making of Modern Europe* will be essential reading for students of both modern European history and urban history.

ANDREW LEES is Professor of History at the Camden Campus of Rutgers University. He is the author of *Cities Perceived: Urban Society in European and American Thought, 1820–1940* (1985) and *Cities, Sin and Social Reform in Imperial Germany* (2002).
