Count to ten

ACTIVITY TYPE

individual make and do, small group matching card game

READING FOCUS

number and word recognition

LANGUAGE FOCUS

numbers 1-10 (word and number)

LEVEL

AGE RANGE

7-8

TIME

40 minutes

MATERIALS

an enlarged copy of each of the two Count to ten worksheets, a copy of the two Count to ten worksheets per pupil, card, scissors, crayons, glue

Before class

Make an enlarged copy of each of the two *Count to ten* worksheets, colour the numbers and the words, stick them onto card and cut them into flashcards. Make one copy of both of the *Count to ten* worksheets for each pupil. To save time, you can make the copies directly onto white card.

In class

- 1 Divide the class into small groups.
- 2 Give pupils a copy of the two worksheets.
- 3 Dictate for them to colour the numbers and/or words:
 - 1 Colour one brown.
 - 2 Colour six grey.
 - 3 Colour two yellow.
 - 4 Colour seven pink.
 - 5 Colour nine red.
 - 6 Colour five purple.
 - 7 Colour three blue.
 - 8 Colour eight green.
 - 9 Colour four black.
 - 10 Colour ten orange.
- **4** Pupils glue the sheets onto card, so that they cannot see through the paper, and then cut each worksheet into ten playing cards.
- **5** Demonstrate the game to the class with a group of four pupils. Using a big table or the floor, spread flashcards out, face down.
- **6** In turn, pupils turn over two cards at a time to find a matching pair. They should name each word or number as they turn the card over, saying e.g. It's ten, ...
- 7 If the two upturned cards do not match, the pupil turns them face down again in their original position and the next pupil continues in the same way. When pupils find a pair, they must say the sentence (It's ten) and then they can keep the pair of cards.
- **8** They continue until no cards are left on the table. The winner is the pupil with the most pairs.
- **9** Circulate as they play. Encourage pupils to use English for communicating while they play, by teaching them essential phrases beforehand: It's my turn. Whose turn is it? How many pairs have you got? You're the winner.

Option

Children could do the colouring part of the activity in a previous lesson or at home (omit the colour dictation step).
