

> Many critics have seen the writing of Henry James as resistant to questions of power, history, and ethics. The Jamesian mode of writing, it has been claimed, actively works against an understanding of the way truth and history circulate in his texts. In this collection of essays, leading scholars of James analyse the strategies he used to address these crucial issues. Enacting history in Henry James proposes a new performative paradigm for reading James's work. It claims that because the reader can never know the truth in any verifiable sense, the type of knowledge available in his fiction is never of a cognitive kind. Rather, the Jamesian text promises an experiential type of knowledge, one that is attained by participating in the power games and moral dramas that unfold within the text. This collection argues that to read James is to enact the history that is staged by the narrative, so that, ultimately, James's texts require not just an emotional responsiveness, but also an ethical assumption of responsibility for the act of reading. By placing James's work in a fresh theoretical context, this book throws new light on this most enigmatic of writers.

He has co-edited Deferring a Dream: Literary Sub-Versions of the American Columbiad (1994), and is the author of Henry James: Style, Ethics and History: A Bibliographical Essay (1996). In 1996-7 he is a Visiting Scholar at Harvard.
- SARAH B. DAUGHERTY is Professor of English at Wichita State University. She is the author of *The Literary Criticism of Henry James* (1981) and of the chapter on this subject in the *Companion to Henry James Studies*. Her current work is on the criticism of Howells and his problematic relationship with Twain.
- WINFRIED FLUCK is Professor and Chair of American Culture at the Freie Universität, Berlin. He has written Populäre Kultur (1979), Theorien amerikanischer Literatur (1987), and Declarations of Dependence: Revising Our View of American Realism (1993).
- ALFRED HABEGGER is an independent biographer and scholar living in Oregon. He has edited *The Bostonians* (1976) and written Gender, Fantasy, and Realism in American Literature (1982), Henry James and the 'Woman Business' (1989), as well as The Father: A Life of Henry James, Sr (1994).
