

Current Issues in Nurse Prescribing



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PREFACE

The introduction of nurse prescribing has meant that nurses have had to acquire new knowledge in a number of fields including ethics, law and Pharmacology. Furthermore, this knowledge has had to be applied to the many issues surrounding prescribing in the practice setting. As prescribing is a new area in which nurses have expanded their practice, there are currently few books available that provide prescribers with information to help them in this role. It is hoped that the information provided in this book will help to fill this gap.

Chapter 1 provides a general overview of the development of nurse prescribing and describes the current education and training available for prescribers. Chapters 2 and 3 describe the legal and ethical frameworks within which prescribers must practise. Practice scenarios are used to illustrate the application of this knowledge. Chapter 4 describes the clinical diagnosis and treatment management of a number of conditions for which nurses are involved in prescribing. Nurse prescribing from a pharmacist's perspective is presented in Chapter 5. Topics discussed include: how pharmacists can support nurse prescribers, sources of drug information, prescribing and group protocols, bulk purchasing, the development of prescribing guidelines and formularies, prescribing budgets and the use of

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prescription analysis and cost (PACT) reports. Finally, Chapter 6 provides a critical account of the implementation of nurse prescribing within one health authority and two adjoining community healthcare trusts. Issues that arose in relation to both education and practice are presented.

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
