

The Creation of Art

Although creativity, from Plato onwards, has been recognized as a topic in philosophy, it has been comparatively neglected in recent philosophical aesthetics. In this new collection of essays a distinguished group of philosophers of art redresses this trend. The subjects discussed include the nature of creativity and the process of artistic creation; the role that creative making should play in our understanding and evaluation of art; relations between concepts of creation and creativity; and ideas of tradition, metaphor, genius, imagination, and genre.

This is an important collection that will be of interest to philosophers of art as well as theorists in art history, cinema studies, and literary criticism.
