Central Cambridge was first published in 1994 in response to the growing number of visitors to the Town and University. Since then there have been numerous re-prints, but this is an entirely updated and expanded version. Cambridge may look as if nothing had changed for centuries, but neither Town nor University have ever stood still. There have been major developments in both since the first edition of *Central Cambridge*.

Cambridge is a remarkable mixture of ancient and modern; town and gown; College communities and academic institutions. It is a product of evolution rather than of deliberate design. There are buildings dating from every stage of its development since the early middle ages. The University and City give it an unique atmosphere as they continue to adapt to changing circumstances, and bring life and meaning to their respective parts of the whole. It is most certainly neither a museum nor a tourist trap.

After some 800 years, the University has become a complex organism, and, for those who have no experience of its contemporary life and activities, a general guide – such as this – is essential to understanding this ancient community and seat of learning, and modern center of research. It describes many of the famous clerics, scholars and builders, who have helped to make its architecture and its history. It also draws a picture of it as a vigorous and energetic part of the educational fabric of our nation, and of the world's academic community as a whole.



Preface and acknowledgements

The first edition of *Central Cambridge: A Guide to the University and Colleges* appeared in 1994. Small-scale updates were made in successive reprints, but this second edition represents the first major overhaul of its content and layout.

The fully revised, updated and redesigned new edition contains freshly commissioned photographs, mainly from the Japanese artist and photographer Hiroshi Shimura; comprehensively updated text, with all facts and figures re-checked, supplemented and updated as appropriate; extensions of the individual college and University entries to incorporate new details and to take account of new buildings; fresh maps, adapted from the latest edition of the official University Map; a significantly extended glossary, further reading section and index; and a new Foreword by the Chancellor, H.R.H. The Prince Philip. Almost every entry in the book has received some update or addition, many of them substantial.
