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## INTRODUCTION AND ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

This selection arose out of the need for those studying the JACT "A" level syllabus for the period 14–117 to have epigraphic and numismatic evidence readily available to them in translation; it is hoped, however, that other students and teachers may find the collection of interest.

## **NOTES**

The arrangement of the entries follows a similar pattern to that of LACTOR 4, *Inscriptions of Roman Britain*. Each entry consists of

- (1) number, title and date of dedication or issue (where known);
- (2) reference to the original document, first in the standard collections for the history of this period (Ehrenberg and Jones, McCrum and Woodhead, and the two Smallwood volumes), then in the major epigraphic and numismatic collections (*ILS*, *IG*, *IGRR*, *BMC*, etc.; also *CIL* in the Concordances);
- (3) site, type of material, when and where found, and where at present located (where known);
- (4) translation;
- (5) notes, partly from the translators, Dr. J. C. Mann, and S. J. Miller, but largely from B. H. Warmington.



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Items which have also been translated in Lewis and Reinhold or in A. H. M. Jones' History of Rome have been noted in the Concordances.

The collection is arranged in chronological order of emperors, and approximately twenty-five items have been chosen from each of the four standard collections.

All dates are AD unless otherwise stated.
