

# MIGRATION IN THE MEDITERRANEAN

Mediterranean States have developed various cooperation mechanisms in order to cope with the issues that arise from migration. This book critically analyses how institutional actors act and interact on the international scene in the control and management of migration in the Mediterranean. Even though the involvement of 'universal' international organizations guarantees a certain balance in setting the goals of cooperation mechanisms and buttresses a certain coherence of the actions, the book highlights how the protection of migrants' fundamental rights is still an objective as opposed to a reality, and security imperatives and trends still prevail in the aftermath of the 2011 Arab Spring.

FRANCESCA IPPOLITO is Associate Professor in International and European Union Law at Cagliari University, Italy, where she teaches, researches and publishes in European Union law, international migration law and international human rights law.

SELINE TREVISANUT is Professor of international law at the University of Utrecht, where her research interests include international law, the law of the sea, international migration law, international environmental law and international economic law.
