The volume will spark renewed discussion about the character of 'ancient' versus 'modern' science, and will broaden readers' understanding of the rich traditions of ancient Greco-Roman natural philosophy, science, medicine, and mathematics.

LIBA TAUB is Director of the Whipple Museum of the History of Science and Professor of History and Philosophy of Science at the University of Cambridge. She is the author of *Ancient Meteorology* (2003), *Aetna and the Moon: Explaining Nature in Ancient Greece and Rome* (2008), and *Science Writing in Greeo-Roman Antiquity* (Cambridge, 2017).
