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PREFACE

THE Latin Text of Bishop Alnwick's Award, or Laudum, has been already issued twice—in the first instance by my Father, Dr Christopher Wordsworth (Bishop of Lincoln, 1869–85) in Statuta Ecclesiae Cathedralis Lincolniensis (8vo, Londini, 1873, pp. xvi+112), which contains the 'Novum Registrum' and the 'Laudum Willelmi Alnwick' (as well as the 'Statuta Vicariorum' and five little documents of the 14th and 15th centuries). On the second occasion the Award was edited by myself, in continuation of the work begun by Henry Bradshaw, in volume III. of Lincoln Cathedral Statutes (Cambridge, 1892–7).

The present Edition, giving for the first time an English translation, was undertaken at the request of the Dean and Chapter of Lincoln, who considered that after the lapse of forty years there was again need for a convenient edition of this Award which all who are collated to stalls in the Cathedral church are called upon at the time of their installation to promise to obey.

They have been fortunate in securing the services of a Lincolnshire Rector, possessing such literary experience as Mr Woolley has acquired, to make an intelligible English version from the cramped and involved sentences of the notary's Latin text, some of the constructions certified by Thomas Colston being sufficient to make the heart of the stoutest translator quail. Such difficulties in the Latin may be in part attributable to some want of scholarship in the scribe himself, but I am inclined to suppose that the



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Bishop's Registrar transcribed faithfully the documents which had been handed to him and certified by Robert Stretton the Chapter-clerk and Thomas Atkyn the Dean's notary on behalf of the two parties then contending and eagerly awaiting a decision from the Bishop. But even in the first part of the troublous reign of King Henry the Sixth the Dean and the Canons at Lincoln had already banded themselves in contrary parts, too ready 'to begin their ancient bickerings'; and often for some 'slight and frivolous cause' those 'factious emulations would arise' which, among other results, render the combatants incapable of weighing well their words. And, in a stormy atmosphere so highly charged, a Bishop called in, as Alnwick was, to arbitrate, might be excused if once and again he uttered and let pass a sentence which calmer revision would condemn, but which might pass muster while he was intent upon understanding the local circumstances and the points at issue between those who recognised his spiritual fatherhood, and while he was doubtlessly filled with such an aspiration as Shakespeare's Duke of Exeter expresses,

"And I, I hope, shall reconcile them all."

Our thanks are due to the Cambridge University Press as well for the care and skill employed in producing the book now presented to the reader, as also for the free scope allowed us in reproducing those portions of the volumes of *Lincoln Cathedral Statutes* which relate to the Lincoln Awards and to the *Laudum* of Bishop Alnwick in particular, with the facsimile of Colston's mark.

Mr Woolley suggests that it may be added that readers who may be sufficiently interested by the perusal of the introduction and the award here printed, and who desire further knowledge of the history of the times when the award was made, and of the general conditions of the



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Cathedral and its Chapter, may be referred to the three volumes of *Lincoln Cathedral Statutes* mentioned above: likewise, to the volumes of *Calendars of Papal Registers*, a series still in progress, to the editors whereof, and especially to Mr J. A. Twemlow, as also to the Very Reverend Joseph Armitage Robinson, D.D. (Dean of Wells), we have elsewhere acknowledged our obligation.

He would wish also to join me in thanking the Dean and other members of the Chapter of the 'City set on an Hill,' who have enabled us to work together in the present congenial task.

THE DECLARATION MADE IN LINCOLN CATHEDRAL CHURCH ON THE OCCASION OF AN INSTALLATION.

- "I, A. B. Canon of this Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Lincoln, and Prebendary of the Prebend of N. founded therein,—
- (Or 'I, A. B. Archdeacon of the Archdeaconry of C. founded in this Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Lincoln':—
- Or 'I, A. B. appointed to the Dignity of D. and Canon of this Church':—)
- "do solemnly declare that I will be faithful to this Church and Chapter, and obedient to the Dean, as Dean, and to his successors, and in his absence or neglect, to the Chapter of this Church; that I will [to the best of my power]¹ observe all the Ordinances² and reasonable and approved Customs³ of the same; ¹that I will faithfully perform the duties of my said Prebend, especially by preaching in this Church at the time appointed to the holder of it⁵. Furthermore⁶ I will to my best assist in defending the rights of this Church; and, so⁵ far as in me lies and

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I lawfully may, I will inviolably observe the **Laudum** or Award of the Venerable Father in God [of pious memory]¹, William Alnwick, sometime Bishop of Lincoln, and all the contents thereof; nor will I² give my assistance, advice, or encouragement to any person or persons whatsoever, desiring or endeavouring to violate that **Laudum**, or [to] contravene the same."

After the act of Installing:-

"Then, all standing up, the Person Installed also rising, the Person Installing shall turn him, and say:—

Look upon the titles of the Psalms, which you are to recite every day³ if nothing hinders."
