The nine units teach different things.

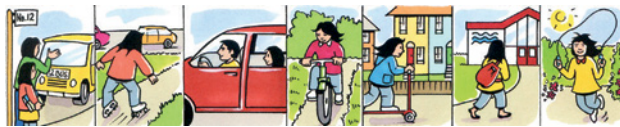
Three units are about fiction:
