#### A NOTE ON CERTAIN CONVENTIONS

No single system of spelling Indian words has been followed. In the case of place names, the old usage is adopted because it occurs so frequently in the quotations: for example, 'Trichinopoly' and not 'Tiruchirapalli'. For other words, such as the Tamil, Telugu and Malayalam agrarian terms, I have generally followed modern usage, but I have not thought it necessary to reach the point of precision of diacritical marks and so forth.

Indian words are italicized, except for names of coins, and for caste names, which are treated like other proper names.

Figures in rupees have been given in crores (I crore = 10,000,000) and lakhs (I lakh = 100,000), but figures of acreage are in millions.


