### PREFACE

In submitting herewith some conclusions regarding the Praxiteles marble group in Olympia, I wish at the same time to express the hope that I shall soon be able to publish some further results of my studies of Praxiteles' captivating art, and to testify my indebtedness to the many persons whose assistance and interest have made possible the production of this book.

First and foremost, let me therefore tender my hearty thanks to Professor Axel W. Persson for his most valuable advice, his kind interest in my work, and his never-failing encouragement.
