Contents. Memoranda of warrants for building and repairing ships and for other naval purposes, and the assignment of moneys granted, 1588-90. There is a list of the Queen's ships at the end of the volume. [513.]

A List of His Majesty's Fleet (of his own and hired ships) employed against Holland, 1671, 1672, and 1673. [825.]

Edward Battine's Method of Building . . . Ships of War.

Paper, $7 \times 4\frac{1}{4}$. Title, dedicatory epistle, and contents + pp. 124. Dated 20 December, 1684. Red morocco elaborately tooled; gilt edges; fairly written. [977.]

Mr. Dummer to Mr. Pepys about improving the Art of Building Ships.

Edmund Dummer was assistant shipwright at Chatham. Pepys describes him early in 1686 as "an ingenious young man." See Catalogue of Pepysian MSS. i. 77 and 92.

The Boke of the Lawe of Olerone: as also for the holdinge of the cowrte of the Admyrallte Per Jamys Humfrey.

Paper, quarto. pp. 415 + table of contents. Dated 1568. Standard binding, but calf instead of sheepskin; handwriting elaborate, with marginal decorations.

Contents. p. 5, form of holding and articles of enquiry in a Court of Admiralty; p. 25, the Laws of Oleron; p. 49, orders for the King or Queen's ships when upon the seas in fashion of war; p. 63, Admiral's instructions made by William Wynter, Esq., 1558, to the captains and masters of a fleet then to be transported to Portsmouth; p. 73, articles appointed by Lord Clinton, admiral of the fleet at this present, 16 July, 1548; p. 79, the rates of wages in peace and war, with the expenses of officers and other charges of the Household of King Edward III, and the number of soldiers by land and sea, and of the ships retained in the wars of that King; p. 103, the sizes of standards, banners, pennons, and guidons; p. 108, a Declaration of an army to be made, 20 March, 1558[-9], of the Queen's and hired ships, with an estimate of the growing charge thereof. The rest of the volume contains surveys, indentures, lists, and tables of various kinds.

An Ancient Discourse and Description of Milford Haven.

38 Eliz. [1596]; the second is an engraved map, laid down by Captain Collins, and dated 1687. [1296.]

Details of the Lennox, third-rate, built at Deptford by Mr. John Shish.

Paper, 8×3 . ff. $50 \times 2 + 11$ blank pp. The Lennox was launched 12 April, 1678. Dark blue morocco; gilt edges. [1339.]

An Establishment of . . Men and . . Guns.

Paper, $7\frac{3}{4} \times 3\frac{1}{2}$. pp. 28, some blank; leaves paged 1–9. Date probably 1677. Red morocco, elaborately tooled in gilt (Mearne's binding?); gilt edges; fairly written. [1340.]

A Discourse touching the Current in the Strait of Gibraltar by Henry Shere.

Paper, quarto. pp. 132. Presentation copy. A letter from the author to Pepys inserted at the beginning, containing a reference to "my Journal, whereof this is almost a perfect transcript," is dated 10 March, 1674-5. Red crushed morocco, with gilt stamps; gilt edges.

An unnumbered page at the end contains four figures in illustration of pp. 7, 63, 84, and 121 of the text, and after this is inserted a letter dated Serjeant's Inn, 20 March, 1696-7, and signed "Littleton Powys," returning thanks for the loan of "a very curious tract, written with great judgment and sagacity."

The "Discourse of the Mediterranean Sea and the Streights of Gibraltar," by Sir Henry Shere, or Sheeres, military engineer and author, was published in 1703 in "Miscellanies Historical and Philological, being a curious collection of private papers found in the study of a nobleman lately deceased." Contents. Documents from I January, 1685-6, to 8 June, 1694. [1490.] [The contents of this MS. are summarised, and its bearing on naval history discussed in Catalogue of Pepysian MSS. i. 66-97 Cf. also MSS. Nos. 1534, 2823, and 2824.]

The State of the Royal Navy of England at the Dissolution of the late Commission of the Admiralty, May, 1684...

Paper, small quarto. pp. 44 + index, etc. Dated 31 December, 1684. Black morocco, with elaborate gilt and blind tooling, and the royal arms on back and front—a very beautiful and striking design; gilt edges; fairly written.

Contents. In the form of a letter to the King this MS. contains a criticism of the Admiralty Commission of 14 May, 1679 to 19 May, 1684, afterwards developed by Pepys in his printed work, Memoirs of the Royal Navy. It is a copy of the original letter "bound as this is, and sealed up," which Pepys presented to the King, I January, 1684-5.

Lieutenant Gradon's Collection of Naval Flags and Colours, 1686.

Paper, quarto. ff. $19 \times 2 + \text{index}$. Dark blue morocco, with panel elaborately tooled in gilt with red and yellow decoration inlaid; gilt edges.

Contents. The naval flags of various countries, illuminated in colour.

[John Graydon, afterwards vice-admiral, had been appointed second lieutenant of the Charles galley, 17 June, 1685. See Catalogue of Pepysian MSS. i. 356 and D.N.B. xxiii. 28.]

Nova Anglorum per mare Cronium ad Moscovitas Navigatio, authore Clemente Adam, Regiorum puerorum institutore.

Paper, quarto. pp. 116 unpaged, some blank. The account was written in 1554. Mottled sheepskin with circular ornament in gilt; gilt edges; elaborate handwriting; style that of an illuminated MS.

There is an Epistle of Dedication to Philip of Spain, headed by his coat of arms illuminated. [1663.]

Of Navarchi.

Paper, quarto. pp. 45 + table of contents and some blank. Thin marbled boards.

A discussion of the "shapes, sails, and other qualities" necessary to a good ship. There are some neatly drawn diagrams to illustrate the text. [1731.]

[Pepys's own title in Supellex Literaria (p. 171) is "A Treatise of Naval Architecture," by Mr. Fortree. It begins: "I shall not treat here of the particular art of building or framing of ships or vessels, but only of the shapes, sails, and other qualities necessary to a good sailer . . ." "Mr. Fortree" is possibly Samuel Fortree, the author of England's Interest and Improvement, consisting in the increase of the store of trade of this Kingdom, Cambridge, 1663.]

Mountgomery's Book of the Navy, written 1570 and 1588; with a Project for a Land Militia, addressed to King Philip, husband to Queen Mary, in the year 1557 or 1558.

Paper, quarto. pp. 31×2 . Vellum. The dedication to the reader in verse is signed "Ber. Gar," and the text is illustrated by pen-and-ink

sketches. The treatise of 1570 contains a scheme for the distribution of the Royal Navy for home defence in three squadrons on our own coasts: the appendix of 1588 gives a more detailed account of the galliasses than is easily to be found elsewhere. [1774.]

["Ber. Gar" is probably Bernard Garter, the poet; see D.N.B. xxi. 30. For copies in the British Museum see Add. MSS. 18035, 20042, 20043, and Arundel 22. The substance of both the original treatise of 1570 and the appendix of 1588 has been printed by Sir Samuel Brydges in Censura Literaria, v. 29, 137, and 260. Another copy of the "Project for a Land Militia" is in MS. No. 2869, infra (Miscellanies, i. 31).

Mr. Hosier's Method of balancing Storekeepers' Accounts.

Paper, quarto. pp. 101 unpaged. Dated 7 November, 1668; a letter to Pepys dated 28 November, 1668, is appended. Vellum, with the royal arms in gilt; gilt edges. [1788.]

[This "method" is referred to in the *Diary* under dates 6 September and 24 November, 1668, and 12 February and 7 March, 1668-9. Francis Hosier was at this time muster-master at Gravesend.]

A Collection of matters touching the Constables of Dover Castle and the Wardens of the Five Ports, gathered out of the records of the Tower and out of Lieger books of Monasteries, by Francis Thynne, Lancaster Herald.

Paper, quarto. ff. $96 \times 2 + a$ few blank. Standard binding.

The contents include, besides the Latin text, p. 2, dedication to Henry Howard, Earl of Northampton, dated 29 July, 1604, with a pen-and-ink drawing of his arms prefixed; pp. 14-15, pen-and-ink drawings of the general arms of the Cinque Ports, and the arms of Lydd, Tenterden, Hastings, and Faversham; p. 90, a list of the Wardens of the Cinque Ports from the reign of Edward III until 1640, with a supplementary list, 1640-85, given to Pepys by Colonel Strode.

A Latin letter of dedication to Pepys from the author, Nathaniel Vincent, is prefixed. The 12 pp. inserted at the end of the volume contain

A Project of a form by an Order of Intrenchment for defence against a landing of any army

Instructions of the States-General of the United Provinces for the Colleges (or Courts) of Admiralty

Paper, small folio. pp. 38 unpaged, some blank. The instructions are dated 13 August, 1597. Marbled boards.

Inserted at the beginning of the volume is a letter, dated 26 March, 1678, from Thomas Bedford to Mr. Pepys, accompanying this "translation of those laws whereby the Admiralties of the States-General (although made provisionally but for a year) are still governed," and sending also for his acceptance "a short treatise written by Dr. Zouch in defence of the declining jurisdiction of the Admiralty."

The Journals of Edward Fenton, gentleman

Paper, small folio. pp. 142 unpaged. Marbled boards, thin leather back.

Contents. (1) Voyage in the Judith as lieutenant-general and second in command to Frobisher in his third voyage to Meta Incognita, 25 May, 1578, to 17 Oct., 1578. (2) Voyage as admiral in the Bear galleon (afterwards called the Leicester), 29 April, 1582, to 2 July, 1583. (3) A small sheet containing a form of prayer is inserted at the beginning of the volume and two memoranda at the end. [2133.]

The contents are in the form of a letter to Pepys arising out of his request for "an account of what improvements the art of navigation

may probably receive from such seminaries of well-educated seamen as that at Christ's Hospital." This led to further correspondence, the original letters being bound up in the volume. [2184.]

Papers of Mr. Halley's and the learned Mr. Greaves's, touching our yet imperfect Attainments in the Art of Navigation: with notes subsequent thereto.

Paper, small folio. pp. 34 unpaged. Mr. Halley's paper is dated 17 February, 1695-6. Mr. Greaves's papers are *circ.* 1640. Art boards.

The contents include a letter from Mr. Hunter, dated 3 July, 1696, "upon information taken by him from the gentlemen of the Trinity House," referring to errors in navigation made by the fleet two days after the battle of Southwold Bay, May, 1672, and by Lord Sandwich on his return from the Sound with a squadron in 1659. Balfour's Practiques

"Presented to the Duke of Lauderdale by his Grace's humble servant Geo. Mackenzie, 14 December, 1676," is written above Pepys's bookplate by a hand much later than that of the text. [2208.]

[Balfour's "Practicks," ascribed to Sir James Balfour of Pittendreich, who died in 1583, is the earliest text-book of Scottish law. It was not printed until 1754.]

Collectiones Trevorianae

Paper, folio. pp. 949 + 16 pp. unpaged. Standard binding.

The contents consist of "particular select heads, transcribed from the more copious common-place book of historical notes taken from records by the learned Arthur Trevor, and lent me (with other like MSS., papers of his) by my honoured friend Sir John Trevor, in favour of my naval enquiries, etc." There is added at the end of the volume "An alphabet of such of the titles in Arthur Trevor's general common-place book as are not taken notice of in this Collection; but may upon occasion be resorted to from the book itself in the hands of Sir John Trevor." [2217.] [MS. No. 2829 infra is a transcript of the Index to the Trevor papers.]

An Abstract of a Declaration of the Navy Royal of England by Anthony Anthony

Paper, $9\frac{1}{2} \times 11\frac{3}{4}$. ff. 10 paper + ff. 20 two thicknesses of thin pasteboard. The original rolls are dated 1546: this may be an abstract made for Pepys. Oblong mottled sheepskin with inlaid panel; brass clasps (one broken); gilt edges.

Contents. Illuminations of three "pinnaces," three "row-barges," six "galliasses," and five "ships," with their tonnage and number of men.
