Henry Thoby Prinsep (1792–1878), a colonial administrator who reached the highest rank in the East India Company and its successor, the Council of India, published this Code of Practice in 1866: the third edition of 1869, reissued here, was necessitated by new legislation in that year. (Prinsep's earlier work, *Origin of the Sikh Power in the Punjab*, is also reissued in this series.) In the preface to this work, written as a guide for local magistrates and administrators, Prinsep states his intent to present, in a convenient form, all the rules of procedure in the criminal courts of British India. Each stage of the process is annotated with explanatory material, and case law and precedents are also cited where appropriate. Appendices contain further relevant legislation, such as rules on extradition and the conduct of the police. An index of cases cited and a general index are also provided.

PREFACE TO THE THIRD EDITION.

The object of this work is to present, in a convenient form, all the Laws and Rules of Practice relating to Procedure in the Criminal Courts of British India which have emanated from the Legislature, the Highest Courts of Justice, or the Executive Government. The Code of Criminal Procedure (Act XXV. of 1861) naturally forms the bulk of this volume; but in an Appendix are given several Statutes and Acts of the Legislative Council of India, which are intimately connected with the subject, and are necessary for constant reference.

The passing of Act VIII. of 1869 has so much altered the Code of Criminal Procedure as to make the second edition of this work defective for purposes of reference, and it has therefore been thought advisable to publish a new edition, incorporating that Act, as well as the most recent judgments of the High Courts.

Under each Section have been entered abstracts from judgments or orders of the superior Courts. These have been obtained either from published reports or from Official records.

The judgments of the Calcutta High Court are taken from Sutherland's Weekly Reporter, which is generally quoted by the Courts, and the new Bengal Law Reports; but in the Index of Cases the corresponding report in the Revenue, Civil, and Criminal Reporter, published by Messrs. Wyman & Co., has also been entered. A few cases have also been taken from the earlier reports by Mr. W. Marshall. The cases decided by the Madras High Court are taken from the reports of Mr. Whitley Stokes, Mr. O'Sullivan, and Mr. J. M. C. Mills; those by the Bombay High Court from the reports by Mr. J. Dunbar, Mr. R. T. Reid, and Mr. Farran; those by the late Agra Sudder Court from reports pub-

lished by that Court; while more recent decisions by the High Court given in the Addenda have been taken from the reports by Moonshee Hanooman Pershad and Lalla Lalitapershad.

The orders quoted, which have not been reported, have been obtained from official records, and have generally been referred to by their number and date.

The marginal references have been continued, as, it is believed, they have been found useful.

The present Edition is brought up to date.

Appendix B, relating to the trial of European British subjects, has been much enlarged; and an Index of cases and orders quoted, as well as an entirely new and copious general Index, have been added.
