Born in Ireland, William Marsden (1754–1836) was a pioneer in the study of oriental languages, in particular those of modern-day Malaysia and Indonesia. At the age of seventeen he joined his elder brother to work for the East India Company in Sumatra, and began researching the languages of the East Indies. He moved to London in 1779 and became associated with its scientific and academic circles, attending meetings of the Royal Society and becoming a friend of Sir Joseph Banks. This gave him access to vocabularies compiled by naval officers, and these, combined with his own observations, allowed him to produce the pioneering works that made his reputation. (His *History of Sumatra* and *Dictionary of the Malayan Language* are also reissued in this series.) First published in 1796, this work helped to fuel the growing interest in languages and philology at the turn of the nineteenth century.

THE following Catalogue is intended to comprise the Titles of the Dictionaries, Vocabularies, Grammars, and Alphabets of all Languages, excepting Hebrew, Greek, and Latin, together with the modern derivatives from the Latin and Gothic, viz. French, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, German, Dutch, Danish, Swedish, and English, and of all Dialects as distinguished from the principal Languages to which they belong; whether feparately published, or found in Accounts of Voyages and Travels or other Works. The multiplicity of Elementary Books in the Classical, as well as in the Modern, cultivated Languages of Europe, would have confiderably increased the bulk and labour of the Collection, and rendered it at the same time less interesting to the Philologist. It was therefore judged expedient to restrict it to those which are not so generally known and studied. The Russian, in respect of its importance and the improvement it has experienced under its present august Patroness, should also have been excepted; but the progress of Slavonian literature in other Countries being as yet inconfiderable, the opportunity was taken of pointing out those Works by which a knowledge of it may be facilitated.
