This volume presents a selection of peer-reviewed articles derived from the wide variety of communications offered to the Ecclesiastical History Society's Summer Conference and Winter Meeting 2016–17. These meetings took place under the presidency of Stewart J. Brown at the University of Edinburgh in July 2016 and at Magdalene College, Cambridge, in January 2017.

We thank Professor Brown for suggesting the theme, 'The Church and Empire', which proved thought-provoking and stimulating, attracting record numbers of participants and communications. We would also like to thank him for his leadership of the society as president for 2016–17.
