## **PREFACE**

Horace has been my favourite author for close on sixty years, ever since I first read Book 2 of the Odes for A-Level in the Latin class of Ronald Fox, for whose wonderful teaching I remain grateful to this day. Until very recently it never entered my head that I might have the privilege of writing a commentary on a work of Horace, but, once the opportunity of Odes 3 arose, I found myself more tempted by the prospect than deterred by the responsibility. The odes of Book 3 are particularly challenging even by Horace's own high standards, and, although it is inevitable that a commentary will reflect the interests and idiosyncrasies of the commentator, my principal endeavour throughout has been to try to understand the Latin and logic of each ode and to convey to readers such understanding as I have acquired. The commentary makes no claim to definitiveness (as if such a thing were ever possible in the case of the Odes), but, given that the series Cambridge Greek and Latin Classics describes itself as being 'aimed primarily at undergraduate and graduate students', I hope at least to have provided these readers with 'all the guidance needed' for their enjoyment of this exceptional and much loved author.

In the course of writing the commentary I have been even more importunate than usual in seeking advice and information from others, and for various kinds of help (sometimes on repeated occasions) I am most grateful to J. N. Adams, A. Bonnell Freidin, W. W. Briggs, F. Cairns, H. Clements, K. M. Coleman, D. C. Feeney, C. H. George, S. J. Harrison, D. Kovacs, J. E. Lendon, D. S. Levene, R. Maltby, R. G. Mayer, E. A. Oakley, for their customary comments and advice and especially for endorsing a somewhat flexible word limit (even so, the amount of quoted Greek has had to be reduced to a regrettable minimum). It is a cause of much sadness that I was unable to consult E. Courtney, who would have relished the opportunity of engaging once more with the Odes of Horace, the subject of his last ever scholarly paper.

By far my greatest debt is to I. M. Le M. Du Quesnay, who devoted an enormous amount of time and labour to commenting extensively on the whole book, correcting mistakes, questioning assumptions, responding to countless emails, and making suggestions (whose adoption almost always goes shamelessly unacknowledged). There is scarcely a page which has not benefitted from his critical attention, and, on the occasions where

## REFERENCES AND ABBREVIATIONS

**Horace's works** are abbreviated as follows: *Satires* (S.), *Epodes* (*Epo.*), *Odes* (C.), *Carmen Saeculare* (CS), *Epistles* (*Epi.*), *Ars Poetica* (AP). Commentators on these works are usually referred to by name only (thus e.g. 'Brink on AP 99'). References to the *Odes* usually omit the title (thus '1.12.2').

Greek Lyric, Elegy and Iambic. Wherever possible I have referred to the Greek lyric poets as edited and translated by D. A. Campbell in the Loeb edition *Greek Lyric* (5 vols., 1982–93). For Pindar I have used the Loeb *Pindar* (2 vols., 1997) by W. H. Race. There are helpful commentaries on selections of Greek lyric poetry by D. A. Campbell (1967), G. O. Hutchinson (2001) and F. Budelmann (2018). There are Loeb editions of Greek elegy and iambic poetry by D. E. Gerber (1999), from which my references are taken; there is a recent commentary on selections from each genre by W. Allan (2019).

**Cross-references.** In the Commentary I use 'Intro.' to refer to the Introduction to the volume, and 'intro.' to refer to the introductory notes to each ode.
