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VIOLENCE AND THE SIKHS

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Violence and the Sikhs

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ABSTRACT: Violence and the Sikhs interrogates conventional typologies of violence and nonviolence in Sikhism by rethinking that religion's dominant narrative as a deviation from the ostensibly original pacifist-religious intentions and practices of its founders. This Element highlights competing logics of violence drawn from primary sources of Sikh literature, thereby complicating our understanding of the relationship between spirituality and violence, connecting it to issues of sovereignty and the relationship between Sikhism and the state during the five centuries of its history. By cultivating a nonoppositional understanding of violence and spirituality, this Element provides an innovative method for interpreting events of "religious violence." In doing so, it provides a novel perspective on familiar themes such as martyrdom, martial race theory, warfare, and (post)colonial conflicts in the Sikh context.
