Emperors and prominent authors are indexed under the name by which they are best known (e.g. Caracalla, rather than M. Aurelius Antoninus; Plutarch, rather than C. Mestrius Plutarchus). All other Roman men are indexed by their Latin nomen, except in the cases of M. Antonius and Cn. Pompeius Magnus, who appear as Antony and Pompey, respectively, in line with the common English forms used in the book.
