*Note:* This Index is first and foremost intended to be *useful* (especially for locating the main themes of the book) rather than unnecessarily comprehensive. For subjects that are discussed throughout, such as ‘philosophy’, references are given only to specific issues raised about the concept or individual debates about it. All names are ordered by the first element of the name that bears a capital letter. Titles of primary sources appear only when they are discussed in the body of the text, not the notes. Names of modern historians appear only when they are mentioned in the body of the text.

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
