

NATURAL PROPERTY RIGHTS

Natural Property Rights presents a novel theory of property based on individual, prepolitical rights. The book argues that a just system of property protects people's rights to use resources and also orders those rights consistent with natural law and the public welfare. Drawing on influential property theorists such as Grotius, Locke, Blackstone, and early American statesmen and judges, as well as recent work in normative and analytical philosophy, the book shows how natural rights guide political and legal reasoning about property law. It examines how natural rights justify the most familiar institutions in property, including public property, ownership, the system of estates and future interests, leases, servitudes, mortgages, police regulation, and eminent domain. Thought-provoking and comprehensive, the book challenges leading contemporary justifications for property and shows how property both secures individual freedom and serves the common good.

Eric R. Claeys is Professor of Law at the Antonin Scalia Law School, George Mason University, Virginia. He has written more than twenty-five articles and book chapters on property, natural rights, and Lockean labor theory.

The image on the cover is an aerial photograph of oil drilling rig on western edge of Williston, North Dakota, by Richard Hamilton Smith. Image courtesy of Getty Images. Williston is at the heart of the Bakken Oil Field Boom, and the metal structure in the foreground is an oil drilling rig. The image is of a bright and prosperous town. I hope that the image interests viewers in three sets of questions central in this book.

For property theorists, the image illustrates vividly how well-designed property rights improve human life. Such rights empower people to put resources to many different uses – commerce, farming, home ownership, and energy production. But how should property rights be designed to empower people and make their lives better?

For lawyers, the picture highlights many of the issues addressed in a complete system of property law. Why let most land become private property but reserve some for public roads? Why does property in each of the lots include attached trees and buildings – but not motor vehicles on the lots or oil pumped from beneath any lot? What laws are needed to stop neighbors from polluting on one another's lots?

And for political theorists, the image illustrates the complicated relationship between individual freedom and just community. Williston is an attractive town – in part because each individual lot is well-kept, and in part because those lots contribute to a satisfying whole. How are individual property rights and the common good arranged together in a just political community?
